


Windows 10, 8 and 7 Accessibility Options

Learn how to turn assistive features on and off quickly with the Ease of Access Center window.

Windows 10, 8, and 7 come standard with assistive technologies that can help you use Windows.

Windows features “Ease of Access Center” that lets you quickly turn on or off common accessibility features like Zoom, VoiceOver, Sticky Keys, and more. You can bring up this window anytime with a simple shortcut.





- On a built-in keyboard of a laptop, or a USB desktop keyboard, by holding the  Windows (or start) key and tapping the letter “U”.
- Otherwise searching “Ease” in the start menu search field.
